





## **Quality Improvement Examples of Waste**

Waste	Description	Example
<b>W</b> aiting	People unable to process their work because they are waiting for people, equipment or information	waiting for: patients; theatre staff; results, prescriptions and medicines; doctors to discharge patients
Overproduction	Producing more than is needed, or earlier than needed by the next process	<ul> <li>requesting unnecessary tests from pathology</li> <li>keeping investigation slots 'just in case'</li> </ul>
Rework & Defects	Rework due to faulty processes Repeating things because correct information was not provided in the first place	<ul> <li>readmission because of failed discharge</li> <li>adverse drug reactions</li> <li>repeating tests because correct information was not provided</li> </ul>







Motion	Unnecessary people motions, travel, walking and searching Things not within reach Things not easily accessible	<ul> <li>unnecessary staff movement looking for paperwork, e.g. drug sheets not put back in the correct place</li> <li>storing syringes and needles at opposite ends of the room</li> <li>not having basic equipment in every examination room</li> <li>Searching for syringe drivers etc.</li> </ul>
Over Processing	Performing unnecessary processing steps that do not add value	<ul> <li>duplication of information</li> <li>asking for patients' details several times</li> <li>repeated clerking of patients</li> </ul>
Inventory	Too much work in progress or stock Information or patients waiting in a queue	<ul> <li>excess stock in storerooms that is not being used</li> <li>patients waiting to be discharged</li> <li>waiting lists</li> </ul>
Transportation	Moving patients and/or materials unnecessarily	<ul> <li>central equipment stores for commonly used items instead of items located where they are used</li> <li>staff walking to the other end of a ward to pick up notes</li> </ul>
